On October 3, 2014, the eve of the Feast of St. Francis of Assisi, as his community was commemorating St. Francis' passing from life in time to life eternal (referred to as the Transitus), our beloved friend and brother in the Lord went home to God

Fr. Benedict Groeschel has been a great friend to the Franciscan Daughters of Mary. When we first began the community, it was Fr. Benedict and his confrere, Fr. Mariusz Koch, CFR who gave our community formation, helping us to grow in our understanding of Franciscan Spirituality and living out the Evangelical Counsels of Poverty, Chastity and Obedience. Fr. Benedict would even invite us to the Friars formation days when they had guest speakers.

There are two favorite personal stories about Fr. Benedict.

Once, when we were visiting him on business in Larchmont at Trinity Retreat., he turned to us and asked us if we liked ducks. Telling us, "Wait here!" he came back with stale bread in hand, saying, "Come with me."

As we walked with him the short distance to a bridge that crosses the inlet he very grandfatherly pointed out the constellations that began to appear in the early evening sky.

Upon reaching the bridge, he called out, "Ducks! Ducks!" As the geese and mallards began swooping in, he told us to stand back, because they didn't know us.

Feeding the ducks by hand, he inquired of them, "Where's Grandma?" He hadn't seen her in a few days. Fr. shared with us that he had named all of the "regulars."

Father's genuineness and love always made you feel like you were part of his inner circle, like family, even though we were from another community.

Being on pilgrimage with Fr. Benedict was always an adventure. In Italy for Padre Pio's Beatification, almost 80 pilgrims followed him on a walking tour of the churches of Rome. Father's energy and walking speed sometimes left even us "young'uns" in the dust.

A local guide led our tour which ended at the Sistene Chapel. But what fun we had when Fr. Benedict would embellish the stories the guide told, even sometimes correcting the tour guide.

The most endearing moment on pilgrimage was when Fr. noticed some stray dogs on our visit to Pietrelcina, Padre Pio's hometown.

Fr. Benedict stopped in a store nearby and got some treats for our furry friends. The picture to the left captured this precious moment. Looking like his Spiritual Father St. Francis, he in like manner had compassion on the starving dogs, giving us a greater appreciation for all creatures Our Good Lord has created.

A Matter of Heart

My cousin recently emailed a conversation she had with her 4 year old son Gennaro:

 \underline{G} : Hey Mom. When does God and Jesus sleep? Is it at night-night time or in the morning?

<u>Mom</u>: I'm not sure G. But I do know that when we talk to them they hear us at *any* time.

<u>G</u>: Well, I can't hear them.

Mom: You hear them in your heart.

<u>G</u>: Where's my heart?

(Mom takes his hand and puts it over his left chest, he feels his heart beating)

G: THAT'S SO COOL!!!

(He starts to walk away, patting his chest, head slightly bent downward, exclaiming loudly)

<u>G</u>: Hey Jesus!!! Are you in there?? Do you like my heart??

What great purity of heart! It's no wonder Jesus told His disciples, "Let the little children come to me and ... for the Kingdom of God belongs to such as these?" Perhaps someday little 4 year old Gennaro will understand how profound these comments are, and how his little example can lead us to God. Asking "When does God and Jesus sleep?" he must have been thinking of God to ponder this question. Scripture is replete with exhortations to meditate on the things of the Lord; like Mary, "reflecting on them in her heart."

Psalm 1:2-3 informs us that there are blessings that follow meditation. "The law of the Lord is his joy; and on his law he meditates day and night. He is like a tree planted near streams of water, that yields its fruit in season; its leaves never whither." Through the advice of his Mom, he is then encouraged to listen. What profound wisdom! Many people ask us how to hear God, but many do not take the time to listen. At Baptism the Holy Spirit comes to dwell within. God is not "out there somewhere," He is here-always within, loving me in every moment of my life. But how can we come to Know Him if all we do is talk and never listen. This is especially true when we make a choice to grow our relationship with the Lord, "Be still before the Lord, wait for Him." "Be still and know that I am God."

Gennaro then has the awesome experience of feeling his heart beat. He is captivated by it and this inspires him to dialogue with God. The Catechism of the Catholic Church teaches us that God's, "invisible nature…has been clearly perceived in the things that have been made." For those who have the eyes to see, everything leads them to God.

Lastly, recognizing God's Presence within his own heart, he is moved toward wanting his heart to be pleasing to Jesus. Isn't this what love does? Wanting to be pleasing to the one loved?

A firm choice and intention to make the heart pleasing to God is, I believe, a sure path to holiness, the holiness Sacred Scripture calls us to:

Leviticus 19:2 "Be holy, for I, the Lord your God, Am Holy."

Ephesians 1:4 "Be holy and without blemish before Him."

1 Thessalonians 4:3 "This is the will of God, your holiness."

1 Peter 1:15 "Be holy yourselves in every aspect of your conduct."

The sisters and I pray to the Lord for the grace to practice these things diligently, so that we may be, as Our Lord Jesus encourages us, "perfect as (my) Heavenly Father is perfect."

INE afternoon I was called to check a homeless man who had fallen on his way to the Mission. In his hurry to get a coat and pick up food for himself he had stumbled and fallen. He was homeless and he had been drinking.

His cheek was badly abraised, with numerous facial lacerations, and he was bleeding profusely from a deep open gash above his eye, which was certainly going to need stitches.

Initially he resisted being taken to the hospital, but after conversation and some gentle persuasion, he agreed. As we waited for the EMT's, he took my hand and wordlessly held it against his cheek for several long moments.

A gentle touch, a brief encounter yes. I was, however, moved beyond words and reminded that God is so very present even in our simplest actions done in love. Sometimes, in those small quiet moments Our Lord is good enough to remind us of His Presence.—Joan Mc Donald. RN
